MASS time changes due to a reducn in clergy numbers will take effect the Wangaratta district's Catholic rishes this weekend.

The recent retirement of Fr Frank rt and Monsignor John White, who re replaced by new parish priest Fr ke Pullar to support Fr Eugene Delarte, means Wangaratta is now opering with two rather than three priests. Accordingly, Fr Pullar said the other and timing of masses needed change.

He said parishioners' reactions to

the reshuffle, which includes suspension of Sunday evening mass as well as some slight scheduling shifts, had been "generally positive".

Mass will now be celebrated on Saturdays at 6pm at St Patrick's Church, and on Saturday at 6pm on rotation at Boorhaman, Eldorado, Tarrawingee and Glenrowan churches.
